RED ROCKING OUT AT THE MOAB MUSIC FESTIVAL 2021

The 29th Season Includes...
A World Premiere By Kenji Bunch, Narrated by George Takei
and Concerts in Outdoor Venues Along the Colorado River, at Local Ranches,
on Musical Hikes, and Rafting Adventures



Moab, Utah - The Moab Music Festival announces an inspiring and powerful 2021 slate of events, running from August 30 through September 16. Whether audiences need a retreat or a reboot after a complicated year, the fabled town filled with charming shops and restaurants, a 3-diamond spa, a top-notch winery, surrounded by Southeast Utah's ruggedly stunning desert, and some of America's best hiking, biking, and jeep trails, is the perfect place to safely spread out and enjoy MMF's trademark world-class live music experiences. The 2020 Festival was one of the only events in the U.S. to welcome live audiences, and in 2021, it will again be live and continue to follow all local, state, and national health and safety guidelines, continuing its commitment to the health and safety of its patrons, artists, and staff as its top priority.

The centerpiece of the 29th season is the launch of its Commissioning Club with the

World Premiere of a work by **Kenji Bunch** for narrator **George Takei** and chamber ensemble about **Japanese** American Confinement in America on **Saturday**, **September 4**th. Other programs bring patrons to an array of outdoor venues along the Colorado River, local ranches, on musical hikes, rafting adventures, and in intimate (outdoor) gatherings, where concert goers will hear world-class performances surrounded by the majestic sky and blazing red rock cliffs as the quintessential backdrop for the musical ride of a lifetime.



MUSICAL RAFT TRIPS

Westwater Canyon Musical Raft Trip, August 30 - September 1
The season kicks off with a journey for lovers of music, nature, and outdoor adventure: a custom 3-day/2-night Westwater Canyon Musical Raft Trip through the Colorado River's Ruby-Horsethief and Westwater Canyons, beginning on Monday,

August 30 at 7am. Living up to the Festival's reputation as "an adventurer's paradise" (*Smithsonian* magazine), voyagers will spend part of the time drifting leisurely at the river's pace, followed by a day of exciting whitewater rapids like Little Hummer, Funnel Falls, Last Chance, and the famous Skull Rapid formed as the Colorado River flows through a narrow black granite gorge. Patrons will enjoy daily concerts by Festival favorites—cellist Jay Campbell and violinist Francisco Fullana—in extraordinary settings, as well as swimming, walks, and sumptuous dining. After bringing their inner rhythms in tune with the river, participants return to Moab on the last evening, Wednesday, September 1, ready to enjoy the rest of the Festival. *Outfitted by Sheri Griffith River Expeditions*.

NEW!...San Juan River Musical Raft Trip, September 13-16

Those adventurers who do not want their MMF experience to end will set out on a custom 3-day /2-night San Juan River Musical Raft Trip down the San Juan River (September 13 through 16). Embark on one last once-in-a-lifetime experience of the 29th Festival, on a scenic float trip on the Upper San Juan River where travelers will enjoy daily and evening concerts by two extraordinary Moab Music Festival Artists, violinist Cindy Wu and cellist Clancy Newman, on one of the prettiest river experiences in the region. A leisurely pace allows patrons to enjoy the spectacular red rock canyons, petroglyph panels, Ancestral Pueblo ruins, remarkable geographic features, and desert wildlife, all illuminated by a naturalist along the way. The trip begins with a dinner and hotel stay in historic Bluff, Utah. The MMF's newest journey, exploring 27 miles of the San Juan from Sand Island to Mexican Hat, voyagers experience good company, spectacular nature and the ultimate melding of music in concert with the landscape.

GROTTO CONCERTS

An exhilarating 45-minute jet boat ride down the Colorado River, departing at 11:30am sharp, will bring listeners to "nature's own concert

hall" (*The New York Times*) – a pristine, acoustically-perfect wilderness grotto carved from the surrounding red rocks. The concerts weave a rich sonic tapestry in one of the most stunning natural environments imaginable, combining the beauty of music with the area's scenic wonders. The first of three signature Grotto



Concerts, Beethoven in the Arches on Thursday, September 2, features virtuoso guitarist Jason Vieaux and violinist Kristin Lee, and the exciting young Junction Trio making its Festival debut in a program which includes Pulitzer and Grammy winning composer John Corigliano's The Red Violin Caprices, derived from his Academy Award winning score to the film of the same name, along with works by Bach and Vivian Fung, culminating in the Trio's interpretation of Beethoven's majestic "Archduke" Trio. On Thursday, September 9, artists will take patrons to Sonic Extremes when a steel pan and marimba in a percussion duo make their grotto debut. Debussy's vocal music and a Bach Suite for solo keyboard bring the afternoon to a transcendent close. Three great composers, Mozart, Beethoven, and Haydn, shape the final program, Mozart and the Classical Style, on Sunday, September 12, along with a contemporary reflection on Haydn. Dazzling pianist and composer Michael Brown performs his own Etude-Fantasy on the Name of Haydn and Ravel's tribute Menuet sur le nom d'Haydn. Patrons join artists for conversation and a few last moments in the grotto at a light reception before jumping on the jet boat and heading back to town - these receptions take place after each concert.

MUSIC HIKES

At each of four invigorating Music Hikes, explorers will discover Moab's natural wonders, as they meet at the Swanny City Park bright and early at 8am and are transported to stunning, surprise locations for an hour-long concert of unparalleled musical intimacy. On Saturday,



September 4, hikers journey to a majestic spot in a secluded canyon ideal for acoustic music to explore the violin's limits and wonders, with a program entitled *Fiddlers Three*, which includes Telemann's solo Sonata and Akiho's striking work for steel pan and violin. Audiences look forward to a brighter future after the past year's hardships in *Pain and Redemption*, curated by cellist Jay Campbell on Sunday, September 5 in another private spot. He juxtaposes the old and new with works reaching back to the Renaissance and Baroque alongside a work by the multi-faceted American composer Caleb Burhans. On Friday, September 10, trekkers will venture to Moab's own meditative inner landscape to hear the Festival's spectacular strings in *Classical Quintets*, a program of luminous quintets by Mozart and Mendelssohn. *Imprints*, on Saturday, September 11, will take adventurers to another equally spectacular wilderness site for the final Hike of the season. The program explores enduring remembrance and the imprints we create in life, from the tracks desert animals leave in the red sand, to the legacies left by loved ones. The eclectic program includes works by the Baroque composer

Heinrich Ignaz Franz von Biber, contemporary composer Shih-Hui Chen, 20th century Dutch composer Theo Lovendie, the string quartet premiere of Pulitzer and Grammy winning composer Aaron Jay Kernis's touching *Elegy (for those we lost)* which commemorates the victims of the Covid-19 pandemic, along with other works for string quartet, including Barber's beloved *Adagio* for strings.

Know before you go: The hike requires a moderate level of stamina, agility, and comfort with uneven footing and potentially some exposure on slick rock. Comfortable outdoor clothing for a desert environment is recommended. Hiking poles are welcome. Please remember to hydrate and bring a water bottle.

RED CLIFFS LODGE

The inaugural work of MMF's Composers Club premieres on Saturday, September 4th, and features celebrated actor George Takei, as narrator and host of a powerful evening entitled LOST FREEDOM:

JAPANESE AMERICAN
CONFINEMENT IN AMERICA.

Written by violist and MMF
Composer-in-Residence Kenji

Bunch and narrated by Takei,



the new work revisits a dark part of American history when Japanese Americans were stripped of their property and liberty, and Takei's own past growing up in Confinement camps during WWII. The piece glimpses at Moab's own part in this tragic time with its Citizen Isolation Center at nearby Dalton Wells. "Although they indeed present a cautionary tale of one of our country's darkest times," Bunch commented "ultimately, we see Mr. Takei's words as a message of hope that relies on the humanity of our generations to come." The premiere is bookended by two compositions by another camp survivor Paul Chihara and Andy Akiho's *Synesthesia Suite*. This program, at Red Cliffs Lodge, honors those citizens and the three Japanese American composers. It exemplifies the potency of art and music and their ability to offer a forum for expression, and is a powerful example that echoes the current climate.

Head back to Red Cliffs Lodge on the banks of the Colorado River on Sunday, September 5 at 7pm, for *Nights in the Garden of Spain*. Concertgoers will be transported to a starry evening evoking the romance, longing, and passion reminiscent of the flowery late nights of Andalusia. The concert features the Spanish guitar, gypsy violin, and the human voice in a concert of classic Spanish works by Granados, De Falla, Turina, and Sarasate.

SORREL RIVER RANCH

Kick off your hiking shoes and head on over to Sorrel River Ranch on Saturday,
September 11 at 7pm for, an exuberant evening with The Manhattan Transfer. The acclaimed group made music history winning Grammys in popular and jazz categories in the same year, and will bring Moab audiences hits in its



signature pop, jazz, R&B, rock & roll, and swing styles.

LABOR DAY EXTRAVAGANZA

Spread out your blanket, soak up the sunshine, and enjoy the Festival's free annual Rocky Mountain Power Family Concert on Monday, September 6 at 2pm at Old City Park when the festival's eclectic programming is on display and offers something for everyone. The all-star program features a rousing and transfixing performance by young percussionist/composer Andy Akiho in his own work, guitarist Jason Vieaux in Pat Metheny's latest work for solo guitar, and soprano Corinne Winters in selections from the American Songbook. The Festival expresses its gratitude to our sponsor, Rocky Mountain Power, for helping the series keep the lights on!



PRIVATE HOMES

On Tuesday, September 7, one of the Moab area's most exclusive homes is the setting for a special celebration of Beethoven. Beethoven as He Heard His Music lets a select audience hear the master's music on the instruments on which it was performed during his lifetime. String instruments and a piano of

Beethoven's era reveal the secrets of period performance practice, with the music being performed in an intimate salon. The concert is followed by an exquisite dinner and wonderful conversation with the artists and other guests. Picture being at a **Private Ranch** on the banks of the Colorado River, on **Wednesday, September 8 at 5:30pm** as the sun sets over the river, with great food, good company, and the sweet sounds of guitarist/singer/songwriter Matt Munisteri and his 21st Century String Band. The ensemble will perform tunes from the Red Hot American Songbook in styles ranging from Ragtime to Swing, shining a spotlight on the bright side of life.

AND IN SCHOOL

Extensive educational outreach is integral to the Festival's activities, and artists will visit The Grand County and The Moab Charter Schools on Friday morning, September 3 for assembly for the high school and middle school students. Students will hear George Takei and the newly written work and learn



about his, and the region's experience. The Festival's ongoing educational programs go beyond performances for students, and include scholarships, teacher support, instrument purchases, and more, giving back to the community which has supported this acclaimed series for over two decades.
