SEASON 32 EXPLORES REGION'S RELATIONSHIP TO THE COLORADO RIVER WITH WATER-THEMED COMMISSIONS, FILM SCREENINGS, PANEL DISCUSSIONS, FLOATING CONCERTS, AND BOAT RIDES TO SECLUDED OUTDOOR VENUES

From Haydn to Hopi Nation, Mozart to Mingus, Bernstein to Bluegrass, Moab Music Festival brings eclectic and varied perspectives to destination venues



Moab, UT— April 9, 2024 — The Moab Music Festival has made music with the mighty Colorado River for 31 seasons. As the region's lifeblood, the river is both a spiritual inspiration to all who visit, and the economic powerhouse of life in the region. It's an integral part of MMF; many concerts take place right next to the river, in red sandstone concert halls carved by the water itself, some even on the water.

From August 28 to September 14, 2024, the 32nd Season of the Moab Music Festival explores the Southwest's complex relationship with the Colorado through music, and the places it's played, contextualizing musical events by raising awareness about persistent drought and overuse of water in the region. John Weisheit, Co-Founder at Living Rivers & Colorado Riverkeeper, and an expert on this section of the Colorado, is the special advisor to this season's festivities. The Festival also welcomes Native voices as it examines the river's many meanings to the communities reliant on it. Performers will include Navajo pianist-composer Connor Chee, and Howard Dennis, a Hopi Flute Chief and advisor to Waterkeeper Alliance, who, with fellow Hopi Nation artists, shares ancient Hopi water rites

at both a new concert event, and at the annual Community Concert.

MMF pays homage to its fluid collaborator this season with themed programs, talks, and screenings, as well as three world premiere commissions. Two emerging composers with ties to Utah, Maya Miro Johnson and Roydon Tse, have each created a new chamber work inspired by the Colorado River for MMF's first-ever Composition Competition. Composer Eve Beglarian, hailed as a "humane, idealistic rebel," (Los Angeles Times), brings a new piece about water to the Festival in tribute to longtime MMF Artist, bassist Robert Black.

Other events this season include a panel discussion and screening of the film *A River Out of Time*; a screening of the film *Maestro* featuring a Q&A with Leonard Bernstein's eldest daughter, Jamie Bernstein; a concert remembrance of longtime MMF artist Robert Black; and a musical ramble around the grounds of new venue Easy Bee Farm. With its signature Floating Concerts aboard an open-air boat on the Colorado; Festival-favorite Music Hikes in remote wilderness areas; and riverside red rock Grotto Concerts, Moab Music Festival makes *music in concert with the landscape*.

NEW VENUE: EASY BEE FARM

Encounter MMF Artists making *music in concert with the landscape* while walking around scenic and sustainable Easy Bee Farm. On **Wednesday**, **August 28**, welcome to the Festival with **A Movable Musical Feast!** Sample a feast of favorites from Mozart, Bach, and Brahms, to Andy Akiho and Giovanni Sollima, while sampling drinks and hors d'oeuvres on the farm.



NEW EVENT: THE HOPI TRADITION

The Hopi are the original caretakers and first users of the Colorado River. On Friday, August 30, members of the Hopi Nation from Second Mesa, Arizona, share ancient and sacred water rites at MMF for the first time through story, costume, dance, and prayer. Howard Dennis, a Hopi Flute Chief, advisor to Waterkeeper

Alliance, board member of Black Mesa Trust, and representative of Native Waters Rising, leads the group. **The Hopi Tradition** takes place at a beautiful outdoor venue on the back lawn of the Gonzo Inn, right beside Mill Creek, a Colorado tributary.

RED EARTH

The glass-walled Red Earth Venue, surrounded by red rock cliffs, sits at the entrance to a sprawling 17acre wilderness in the heart of canyon country. On Thursday, September 5, MMF returns to the Venue for the second time, with a program of American music from the middle of the 20th century. Mid-Century Modern America links space-age design and trends in classical music through a diverse survey of mid-century composers, from Charles Mingus to Giancarlo



Menotti. Both streamlined and smoky, modern and nostalgic, sparkly and spiky, midcentury American music runs the gamut, looking both to the future, and the past.



STAR HALL

Historic Star Hall in downtown Moab offers the intimacy and acoustic clarity ideal for both chamber music and film screenings in a comfortable and easily accessible indoor setting. The award-winning film *A River Out of Time* comes to MMF for a pre-Festival water-themed kick off event on Sunday, August 25. While paying homage to the

Colorado River—the spiritual backbone of the American West—the film draws the Basin's current water crisis into sharp focus as it follows a diverse group of whitewater enthusiasts, educators, scientists, and artists retracing and reimagining John Wesley Powell's exploratory 1869 Colorado River expedition.

The film *Maestro*, which chronicles the relationship between conductor Leonard Bernstein, and his extraordinary wife, Felicia Montealegre Cohn Bernstein, created a sensation when it came out last fall. Bernstein was a global force during his life, but the Festival has its own special connection to the iconic Maestro. On **Tuesday, September 3**, get an intimate look at this glittering historical figure with a screening of the film accompanied by stories from his eldest daughter Jamie, and MMF Music Director Michael Barrett, who was Bernstein's assistant conductor for six years.

On **Saturday, September 7**, MMF honors the memory of trailblazing bassist Robert Black, a core Festival Artist for over three decades. A founding member of the Bang on a Can All-Stars, Black's extensive career championing new music expanded both the repertoire and capabilities of his instrument. In **A Joyful Musical Life from the Bass Line**, MMF pays homage to a dear friend with new and filmed works by Black's collaborator Yoshiko Chuma, an MMF commission by Black's close friend composer Eve Beglarian, and a new solo by Black's former student Zach Rowden, among other tributes.

FLOATING CONCERT

Back for the third time, the

Festival's much talked-about Floating Concerts take patrons several miles up the Colorado River on an openair river boat. There are two chances to experience music and the river as never before this season. First, on Friday, August 30, Keyboards on the Colorado returns music born of water to its spiritual home. Barcarolles, literally "boat songs," mimic the gentle sway of the current, while



Ravel's *A boat on the ocean* and Smetana's ode to his hometown river the Moldau get a bit more tempestuous. A special preview of a new work for piano and percussion by Michael Stephen Brown with the composer performing brings the form into the present—floating on the Colorado River.

On **Sunday, September 8**, Miclen Laipang, a young violin virtuoso on the rise, travels from his current homebase in Paris to curate **Red, White, and Blues**, a special program of French and American music featuring Ravel's Violin Sonata. Pianist Julia Hamos, another brilliant young American currently based in Europe, completes the star-spangled, bicontinental duo with eclectic dynamism. Moab Music Festival Music Director Michael Barrett joins for lyrical works by Claude Debussy and Amy Beach.



GROTTO CONCERTS

An exhilarating high-speed boat ride down the Colorado River brings listeners to "nature's own concert hall" (*The New York Times*), an acoustically pristine wilderness grotto carved from the surrounding red rock. One of the Festival's signature events, **Grotto Concerts** weave a rich sonic tapestry in a stunning natural environment, enriching beautiful music with the area's scenic wonders.

The season's first Grotto Concert on **Thursday, August 29** explores the musical connections between

Johannes Brahms and his mentor Robert Schumann. **19th Century Classics** contrasts Schumann's sunny and optimistic Piano Quartet with Brahms' brooding, probing Piano Quintet.

On **Friday, September 6**, a string trio arrangement of Bach's revered "Goldberg Variations" takes pride of place in **J.S. Bach and Sons**, a concert featuring papa Bach's music alongside that of his children. Carl Philip Emmanuel and Wilhelm Friedemann represent the next generation; their works demonstrate the development of the Classical Style in the 18th Century.

The season's final Grotto concert celebrates the turn of two centuries, the 19th and 20th, on **Wednesday**, **September 11**. In **Vienna at the Turn of the Centuries**, Joseph Haydn represents the high classicism in vogue around 1800, while Fritz Kreisler's music for solo violin bids a nostalgic farewell to the 19th century and its values—including tonality. Schoenberg's *Transfigured Night*, poised on the threshold of the 20th century, expands 19th-century harmony into a world of looming social and scientific upheaval.

MUSIC HIKES

Among its most popular events, MMF's three Music Hikes offer unparalleled access to the natural wonders of Moab. Guides lead trekkers into secluded canyons, where an hour of impeccable music awaits, performed by Festival artists in river-carved canyon concert halls. Adventurers meet at Moab's Aarchway Inn at 7:30 am and board



shuttles to the hikes' surprise locations. The hikes require a moderate level of stamina and agility, so comfortable desert environment clothing is recommended.

On **Saturday, August 31, Mozart in the Morning** features two of the great genius' masterpieces: the Clarinet Quintet, and the work Einstein called "one of his noblest," the Divertimento for string trio.

On **Sunday, September 1, Just Breath(e)** explores the transcendent connection between breath, life, and flute. This theatrically conceived program tells an ancient tale of life, breath, and music anew, through a collection of newly written miniatures by a diverse array of composers. Works by Timo Andres, Clarice Assad, Kinan Azmeh, Juhi Bansal, Viet Cuong, Ellis Ludwig-Leone, Diane Monroe and Matthew Evan Taylor are intertwined with specially arranged works by Andy Akiho, Raven Chacon, Chris Cerrone and Kevin Puts that play on the same theme.

During the final hike of the season, on Saturday, September 7, uncommon groupings expand sonic possibilities with Unusual Quartets: Sacred and Profane, which features works for a quartet of cellos, and a quartet by fiddler Mark O'Conner that replaces the second violin with a double bass.



RED CLIFFS LODGE

The festival returns to picturesque **Red Cliffs Lodge** overlooking the Colorado River and backed by towering red rock walls for two concerts this season. It's a location and view you may well recognize from its many film and television appearances.

The Colorado River flowing

through Moab sets the scene for

two **World Premieres** about water commissioned by the MMF Commissioning Club from up-and-coming composers with Utah ties in **Colorado Currents**. On **Saturday, August 31**, the new works, by Maya Miro Johnson and Roydon Tse, accompany pieces by Utah composer John Costa, Diné composer Conner Chee, and performances by members of the Hopi Nation.

In a panel discussion before the performance Saturday, August 31, experts and musicians discuss the importance of water, Colorado River stewardship, and Hopi religious beliefs. Panelists include John Weisheit, Co-Founder at Living Rivers and Colorado Riverkeeper, Howard Dennis, Hopi elder and board member of Black Mesa Trust, and this year's MMF Commissioning Club grantees composers Maya Miro Johnson and Roydon Tse.

Back by popular demand after its MMF debut last season, indie-pop sibling trio**BAILEN** brings flawless harmonies and bumping energy to the main stage at Red Cliffs Lodge on **Sunday, September 1**. The NYC-based band, noted for a "sumptuous blend of adventurous songwriting, wistful melodies and youthful spirit" by *The Indy Review*, perform a mix of originals, classic 70's pop, and rock.



LABOR DAY EXTRAVAGANZA

The entire community is invited to soak up the sunshine at the Festival's free annual Rocky Mountain Power Community Concert. Come together on Labor Day, Monday, September 2 beneath the shady cottonwoods at gorgeous Old City Park for a joyous celebration of the community MMF calls home. The wide ranging program includes

music from the American Songbook, a work by Diné composer-pianist Connor Chee about his musical heritage, duos for flute and marimba, and a special performance of traditional song and dance by Hopi Nation artists. The siblings of indie-pop trio BAILEN finish the program with adventurous and melodic originals.

PRIVATE RANCH BENEFIT CONCERTS

This season there are two opportunities to join Festival artists at some of Moab's most beautiful **private homes** for intimate evenings of music and food. The convivial occasion offers an exceptional opportunity to experience a performance up close, followed by a celebratory dinner and an opportunity to mingle with the artists.



First, in Bernstein, an Intimate Portrait on Wednesday, September 4, join Leonard

Bernstein's daughter Jamie Bernstein, author of the acclaimed memoir *Famous Father Girl*, as she shares family stories and insight into the evening's selections of her father's work.

Then, on **Tuesday, September 10**, at a private working ranch on the banks of the Colorado, GRAMMY-nominated violinist Tessa Lark sparks a lively evening of virtuosity and fun with **Stradgrass**, a concert of selections from her latest album*The Stradgrass Sessions*, which combines classical technique and Kentucky Bluegrass tradition to footstomping effect.

MUSICAL RAFT TRIP

The festival concludes with the trip of a lifetime for adventurous music lovers. The Cataract Canyon Musical Raft Trip takes participants through glorious Canyonlands National Park, and some of the country's most challenging whitewater, on a custom 4-day/3-night itinerary. After an orientation Tuesday, September 10, the adventure begins with MMF's signature Grotto Concert Wednesday, September 11. Expert guides set



up camp and cook delicious meals at gorgeous riverside sites each night, as three remarkable MMF artists, Tessa Lark, Kristin Lee, and Jay Campbell, serenade guests with everything from Baroque to Bluegrass. A scenic return flight over Canyonlands National Park returns adventurers to Moab on the final day of the trip, **Saturday, September 14**.
